Before Chalkbeat, Julie was retired for a full year from the Detroit Free Press -- or at least she thought she was. She started there in 1983 as a copy editor, writing headlines and editing reporters' stories before they were published. By the time Julie retired in Oct. 2015, she was in charge of daily operations for features, entertainment, sports, investigations and education, supervising four department heads and their staffs. Over her career, Julie also supervised other newsroom departments and areas, including the copy desk, library, news desk, national and international news desk, page designers, and the high school journalism program. She supervised the staff of the children's newspaper, the Yak, for several years. For two years (before emails!) she served as the newspaper's ombudsman, fielding feedback from Free Press readers and helping the staff become more customer focused -- as well as helping readers understand what news gatherers do. Julie was part of the newsroom's strategic planning team and brainstormed with other editors how to become a multi-platform publication.

In the late 1990s, Julie left Detroit to worked in Charlotte, N.C. for three years before deciding to return home to Detroit. While in Charlotte she led a task force on increasing the number of women readers and was awarded for her work in improving the work and morale of the copy desk.

After a year of retirement from the Free Press, Julie decided to join Chalkbeat, where she supervises two reporters in Indianapolis and one in Detroit. It is the smallest job she has held in a long time.
